

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

The 2015/2016 Financial Year was marked by heightened activities at the Media Council of Kenya.

As the leading institution in the regulation of media and in the conduct and discipline of journalists, the Media Council of Kenya continued to make tremendous strides in efforts to achieve its objectives.

The Council has remained steadfast in ensuring that Journalism professional standards are upheld in the Kenyan media, media freedom is protected and journalists are independent and accountable. The Council has remained in the frontline in ensuring the protection of the rights and privileges of journalists in the performance of their duties as guaranteed by the Media Council Act 2013.

We have engaged with various institutions including the judiciary, the executive and the legislature in our efforts to promote, protect and ensure independence of media in Kenya. The Council has requested the judiciary to refer matters related to complaints against the media to the Complaints Commission, established by the Media Council Act, for consideration and adjudication in the first instance, before engaging litigation in the courts of law.

We have also asked the Ministry of Information Communication and Technology to petition the national assembly to repeal /amend laws that unjustifiably constrain the freedom of the press. The Council has also undertaken a program with the Ministry of Interior to train both security officers and journalists on safety skills.

In the period under review, the Council developed a press card verification mobile system in a bid to root out quacks from the profession. Through the system, one sends a press card number to 0715000111. The system responds with the details of the journalist and the expiry period.

In our efforts to promote media excellence in Kenya, the Council organised the fifth Annual Journalism Excellence Awards (AJEA) as one of the major events around the May 3rd 2016 World Press Freedom Day celebrations. The ceremony was graced by the former Chief Justice, Dr. Willy Mutunga.

It was also on the same day that the Council hosted media practitioners from Kenya and other parts of Africa for a convention which was officially opened by the Principal Secretary, Ministry of Information, Communication and Technology, Mr. Samuel Itemere.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

The 2015/2016 Financial Year saw the Council remain at the forefront in promoting and protecting the freedom and independence of media in Kenya, the protection of rights and privileges of journalists in the performance of their duties while at the same time ensuring that journalists conduct themselves professionally and are accountable.

The Council, together with other stakeholders including; Kenya Union of Journalists(KUJ), Kenya Correspondents Association(KCA), Kenya Editors Guild(KEG) and Media Owners Association(MOA) remained steadfast in challenging sections of the Kenya Information and Communications Amendment Act (KICA 2013) that were undermining media freedom and freedom of expression.

Specifically, the sections established a tribunal to regulate the conduct of journalists with severe fines (US \$ 5000 for journalists and US\$ 200,000) to violators of the professional Code of Ethics in effect criminalizing breaches of the code of conduct for the practice of journalism in Kenya.

These fines hamper media freedom and constraints freedom of expression. The matter was determined on 27th of May, 2016 with no changes in these provisions opting to amend the same through parliament.

The Media Council of Kenya advocated and lobbied for the drafting and enactment of the Access to information Act 2016. This was achieved through marshaling of stakeholders including Members of Parliament towards this objective.

The bill was eventually signed into law by the President on 31st August, 2016. The law allows the public including journalists to seek information from government, and obliges public servants to provide that information. This is a big boost to journalists to effectively play their watchdog role in society and uphold governance and hold leaders to account for their decisions and actions affecting the publics.

The Council is also actively lobbying for the repeal/amendment of laws or sections of the law that violate freedom of expression. They include criminal libel, official secrets Act. This will go a long way in promoting press freedom and synchronise these laws to the Constitution of Kenya (2010), Article 34 on Media freedom.

Additionally, and as per our 2013-2018 Strategic Plan, the Council has continued to advocate for protection of journalists while on duty and has consistently condemned the harassment and intimidation of journalists as such incidents are inimical to Article 34 of the constitution of Kenya which guarantees the freedom of the media and democracy in general. We have liaised with security agents to ensure the safety of journalists.

Our Accreditation function was actively involved in maintaining a roll of journalists practicing in Kenya, hence checking the proliferation of our profession by quacks.

The Council also intervened where the media compromised journalistic standards through an effective media monitoring function, whose feedback informed our work.

The Council continued to undertake training of journalists in different fields, with special emphasis disaster management, elections reporting, mining and conflict-sensitive reporting. The Council also partnered with International Finance Corporation and Bloomberg Philanthropy to train media stakeholders in Corporate Governance and Financial and Business reporting.

This was out of the recognition that quality training is Key to professionalism and development of the media. In the reporting period, the Council took the lead in developing a curriculum for middle level colleges offering journalism training. This is part of a wider mandate that will see the forming of an accreditation and joint examining body for media colleges in Kenya.

We are grateful for the support we have continued to receive from the government, government agencies and our development partners in pursuit of our mandate of promoting press freedom and responsible journalism in Kenya.

The Council members have committed themselves to the service of the Council and to uphold the tenets of good corporate governance by being responsible, transparent, accountable, efficient, effective, persons of integrity and exercise fairness in all their dealings.

The Council

The Council consisted of seven non-executive Council members and a Chief Executive Officer.

The seven members are appointed by the Media Owners Association, Kenya Union of Journalists, Law Society of Kenya, Editor's Guild of Kenya, and Schools of Journalism of recognized universities, Kenya Correspondents Association, Public Relations Society of Kenya, Kenya Institute of Mass Communication and the Kenya News Agency. This is within the provision of the Media Act 2007 repealed through the Media Council Act 2013

The Council members posses a broad range of skills, qualifications and experiences required to direct the affairs of the Council.

Council Responsibilities

The independence of the Council's board from its corporate management is ensured by the separation of the functions of the Chairman and the Chief Executive Officer and a clear definition of their responsibilities. This helps in achieving an appropriate balance of power, increased accountability and improved capacity for decision making, independent of the management.

The Council is accountable to the stakeholders and retains ultimate responsibility for the Council's performance.

It takes on the primary responsibility of determining the Council's vision, mission, and values; deciding its strategic objectives and key elements of the governance processes underpinning the operation of the Council. The Council members retains full and effective control over the Council by monitoring the management in its implementation of Council plans and strategies, review of management accounts, and major capital expenditure.

The Council exercises diligence in carrying out its role, with emphasis on strategic issues and policy matters. On a quarterly basis, Council evaluates an operational report from the Chief Executive Officer which includes management accounts for the past quarter, reports from each Council committee; specific proposals for capital expenditure and acquisitions; as well as strategic opportunities for the Council.

Council Committees

The Council committees facilitate decision-making to assist the Council in the execution of its duties, powers and authority. However, delegation of authority to the committees does not in any way mitigate the discharge by the Council of its duties and responsibilities.

The Council has set up four Committees which draw its membership from the Council members. The

STATEMENT OF COUNCIL MEMBERS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Section 8(1) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and the Media Council Act 2013 requires the Council to prepare financial statement, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Council at the end of the financial year and the operating results of the Council for that year. The Council Members are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Council.

The Council Members are responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Council's financial statements, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the entity for and as at the end of the financial year ended on June 30, 2016. This responsibility includes: (i) maintaining adequate financial management arrangements and ensuring that these continue to be effective throughout the reporting period; (ii) maintaining proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the entity; (iii) designing, implementing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, and ensuring that they are free from material misstatements, whether due to error or fraud; (iv) safeguarding the assets of the Council; (v) selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and (vi) making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

The Council accept responsibility for the entity's financial statements, which have been prepared using appropriate accounting policies supported by reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates, in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards(IPSAS), and in the manner required by the PFM Act and the State Corporations Act. The Directorsare of the opinion that the entity's financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of entity's transactions during the financial year ended June 30, 2015, and of the Council's financial position as at that date. The Council Members further confirm the completeness of the accounting records maintained for the entity, which have been relied upon in the preparation of the entity's financial statements as well as the adequacy of the systems of internal financial control.

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are set out below:

(a) Statement of compliance and basis of preparation - IPSAS 1

The Council's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The financial statements are presented in Kenya shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the Council and all values are rounded to the nearest Kshs. The accounting policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented.

(b) Revenue Recognation

Subscriptions and donations

Subscriptions and donations are recognized when received.

Government grants

Grants are recognised when they are received. Grants for the recurrent expenditures are recognised as income through the statement of comprehensive income over the period so as to matched against related costs incured during the year.

Grants for capital expenditure (development grant) are recognised as deferred income under capital approach through statement of financial position per IPSA 23.

(c) Property, plant and equipment - IPSAS 17

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful life, using reducing balance method, using the following annual rates:

(d) Intangible Asset

An intangible asswet is recognised when;

i. is propable that the future economic benefit that are attributable to the assset will flow to the entity and ii. The cost of the asset can be measured reliably

(e) Contingent liabilities

The Council does not recognize a contingent liability, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

(f) Contingent assets

The Council does not recognize a contingent asset, but discloses details of a possible asset whose existence is contingent on the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Council in the notes to the financial statements. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits or service potential will arise and the asset's value can be measured reliably, the assetand the related revenue are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs.

(g) Changes in accounting policies and estimates - IPSAS 3

The Council recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes inaccounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical

(h) Related partyDisclosure(IPSAS 20)

IPSAS 20 requires the disclosure of the existence of related parties and information about the transactions between related parties. These disclosures are required for accountability purposes and to allow a better understanding of the financial performance and position of the entity. The standard provides guidance on the identification of related parties and what information should be disclosed.

(i) Leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to income as they accrue over the term of lease.

(j) Financial InstrumentsDisclosure(IPSAS 30)

IPSAS 30 describes the disclosure requirements that enable users of the financial statements to evaluate [IPSAS 30.1]:

• the significance of financial instruments for the entity's financial position and performance

(k) Translation of foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies during the year are converted into the functional currency, Kenya Shillings, using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from translation at recognized in the statement of comprehensive income

(l) Receivable

Subscriptions receivable are carried at anticipated realizable value. An estimate is made for doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the year end. Bad debts are written off during the year in which they are identified.

(m) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and

REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Media Council of Kenya set out on pages 1 to 10, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2016, and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net assets, statement of cash flows and statement of comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information in accordance with the provisions of Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya and Section 35 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. I have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of the audit.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (Accrual Basis) and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

The management is also responsible for the submission of the financial statements to the Auditor-General in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

Auditor-General's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on the audit and report in accordance with the provisions of Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and submit the audit report in compliance with Article 229(7) of the Constitution. The audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions. Those standards require compliance with ethical requirements and that the audit be planned and performed to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of
